### **Barley & Barkway's Courageous Advocacy**

The children of Barley and Barkway Federation are working alongside the Friends of the Rib and Quin to campaign for the protection of the chalk streams in the county. They have explored where these streams are, what their natural qualities are and the animal species and vegetation native to them. It is clear that these streams need protection. Pupils have investigated the negative effects that pollution,



climate change and over-extraction are having on the streams. The school's Eco Council has shared information in their classes and talked about the global problem of sewage and that the local sewage infrastructure is unable to cope with the large volumes of toxic waste that need to be processed. They have been monitoring the local spillages.

They have been supported by Mark Williamson, from the Friends of the Rib and Quin, who came to give the school a detailed presentation to build on what they already knew. The Eco Council wrote a letter to Thames Water to complain about the severe overspill of sewage in the local rivers. The school also wrote a letter to Steve Barclay, former Secretary of State for Environment, Food and Rural Affairs expressing their concerns and disappointment with the current situation and asked their local MP, who came to meet the school's Eco Council to discuss their work, if he could deliver it to the minister in person.

## Forest School Worship at Nash Mills



To develop their worship offer Nash Mills Primary have introduced Forest School worship. Each Key Stage has a regular slot planned where they use their outdoor spaces to consider the world around them and how fortunate they are to have it. Using a range of stimuli, including the Diocesan 'Heart for the Earth' resource, the children are able to spend time looking at all of the amazing

things in the environment and consider the awe and wonder it inspires.

The group from Years 5 and 6, on the other hand, opted for an investigation into the most effective ways to clean up and remove oil spillages from marine animals and their habitats. Each group prepared engaging display boards to help present their work and findings to the children attending from other local schools, and even had some fun, hands-on activities for them to do to help bring the science to life. The event was a huge success and the children did an amazing job of showcasing their scientific knowledge, as well as helping to spread a really important message about looking after our planet. This term both Wrestlingworth and Dunton Lower Schools took part in a special 'Sing Up Day'. Since 2010, Sing Up (an Help kids find their voice organisation that encourages

The Schools Mark involved a visit by members of the EMWiE team and the completion of self-review documents, reflecting on current practice and identifying both strengths and areas for improvement.

The areas reviewed are: Leadership and management; environment and ethos; curriculum, teaching and learning; pupil voice; staff development, health and wellbeing; identifying need, impact and monitoring; working with parents, families and carers; and targeted support and appropriate referrals.

Aligned to the principles proposed by the Department for Education's guidance for promoting and supporting mental health and wellbeing in schools and colleges, the Schools Mark was co-designed with education professionals in the EMWiE team, which is part of Hertfordshire's Children and Young People's Mental Health System. The Schools Mark replaces the Healthy Young Minds in Herts accreditation which St Mary's previously held.

## St John's Vision Morning



In the first half of the Summer term St John's, Radlett held a Vision Morning. The purpose of this was to familiarise the children with the school vision which is 'Start children off on the way they should go and even when

they are old, they will not turn from it' Proverbs 22:6.

Revd Ollie led a Worship to begin the morning. He spoke about going on journeys and pilgrimages and linked this to life being like a journey. The school joined in with chanting the school vision as Revd Ollie took some children on a journey around the hall.

Everyone then took part in discussions in their classrooms related to what kind of person they want to be when they are older and what values are important to achieve this. The children then created a piece of artwork on tiles based on the vision. The children enjoyed this activity and created beautiful pieces of art, some of which has been used to make a display in the school entrance hall.

#### St Michael's Achieve Wellbeing in Schools Mark

St Michaels Primary School, Bishop's Stortford, have received congratulations from the Hertfordshire Emotional and Mental Wellbeing Team on achieving the Emotional and Mental Wellbeing in Schools Mark. This award reflects the commitment the school has in place to put the mental health and well-being at the forefront of all they do. Part of the process in achieving the award was welcoming one member of the Hertfordshire team in to visit. The response received in the subsequent report stated what an extremely welcoming place the school was to visit.

Headteacher, Miss Rachel Griffiths said, "We understand that the positive mental health of our staff, children and families is vital to achieve the best that we can as a school and so it is fantastic that the work we do in this area has been recognised. Part of the process in achieving this award was to draw up a plan of action of how we will ensure that this work continues and we are committed to striving to support our whole school community to live 'Life in all its fullness' through promoting and developing positive mental health and wellbeing."

#### Celebrating the Good in the World

Students at Edwinstree Middle School have spent time celebrating the beauty of nature and wildlife, both locally and around the world. They highlighted that technology was one of their 'goods' about the world and their hope that it will help to reduce climate change. They celebrated human endeavour in sport and exploration, the beauty of the arts and music.

When we consider creation and all that is good, we should temper this with the ongoing news about climate change and the increase in plastic pollution. The school have been working hard to support their students to know that making one very small change in the way we live our life can make all the difference. In May, students were encouraged to embrace 'No Mow May' to create an environment where insects can thrive.

#### **Sutton School's Curriculum in Church**

As pupils began preparing for transition to the next year group, Sutton School's Curriculum in Church session had a focus on facing and coping with change. Revd Alex asked the children about changes that they had experienced or were going to experience soon. He shared the story of St Thomas who moved to Kerala, India to build a Church.

The children were encouraged to reflect on the story and think about whether change was always only positive or only negative. They talked about the mixture of emotions experienced when facing and going through change.

Revd Alex explained that during change it is helpful to remember our identity and our purpose. Pupils were reminded that they have a Sutton School identity and their purpose is to 'shine as lights in the world' by living out the school's values.

# **NEWS FROM THE SCHOOLS TEAM**

#### Focus on Governance—Foundation Governor Recruitment

Throughout the current school year, I have heard from many schools how difficult recruiting foundation governors continues to be, particularly in rural areas and for VA schools. Many schools have also struggled to identify governors to take on the role of Chair or co-Chair.

Governor recruitment is a national issue, with approximately 20,000 governor places vacant countrywide (NGA estimate, 2022). The situation is not helped by the imminent withdrawal of government funding from the national recruitment agency *Inspiring Governance*, which could sometimes reach potential volunteers that it was hard for schools to identify independently.

If your governing board is struggling to recruit foundation governors, do ensure you are exploring all available avenues. A great many are still drawn from local parish churches, but there is also a sizeable minority from other Christian denominations and from the wider local community. It is of course, essential that schools' Anglican Christian ethos is upheld by governors; but it is also vital to ensure that there are sufficient governors on the board with a range of skills to carry out the statutory duties of governance.

There is no diocesan 'pool' of potential governors, but governing boards (and PCCs where they are a foundation appointing body) are welcome to contact me directly for advice on governor recruitment and possible points of contact, specific to your local context. Please do contact me directly in September if you would find some input from me helpful for the 24/25 school year.
